After approval and a one-time membership fee, your first car will be delivered to you anywhere in metro Atlanta. When you're ready for a different model, just request it on the Porsche Passport app. The monthly membership plan costs \$2,000 or \$3,000, depending on the models you prefer, and includes frequent vehicle exchanges and unrestricted miles, plus vehicle tax and registration, insurance and maintenance. Consider Porsche Passport one of the many perks of living in Atlanta—the city is the first (and, so far, only) to offer the program.

## MOST EXTENSIVE, EXPENSIVE WINE LIST

There are plenty of great wine destinations in town, but the one with the most impressive wine list is Atlas. Nestled into The St. Regis Atlanta, the artcentric restaurant has some of the biggest, baddest bottles around town included in its over 600-bottle selection. From dry wines going back to 1970 to sweet wines dating as far back as 1934, plus in-demand bottles such as François Carillon, Puligny-Montrachet 1er Cru Les Combettes 2015 and El Maestro Sierra Pedro Ximénez Viejo. Bottles can get up into the thousands, but they're worth every penny—the assortment runs wide from Sassicaia half bottles to verticals of Movia Ribolla orange wine, Paolo Bea, Groth and more.
